New York State Sexual Assault Victim Bill of Rights

If you wish, all the information can be explained to you in more detail before any exam or interview takes place.

General Rights

You cannot be treated differently based on certain characteristics, such as race, national origin, religion, sexual orientation, disability, age, source of payment, sex, gender identity, or gender expression.

Your immigration status or national origin cannot affect your emergency care or services. You can ask for an interpreter if it is hard for you to understand or speak English.

Minors under the age of 17 have certain rights to make their own decisions without a parent or legal guardian.

New York State Sexual Assault Victim Bill of Rights (cont.)

Hospital Emergency Department Rights

- You can have an advocate from the local rape crisis program stay with you during the exam.
- You can have an exam in any hospital emergency department to collect evidence and provide certain medical care related to the sexual assault at no cost to you. If you do not have health insurance, or you decline to use your health insurance, you can ask the hospital to bill the Office of Victim Services.
- You can have medicine to prevent pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections (STIs, also known as STDs) for free. For HIV prevention, a 7-day pack of medicine can be started at the hospital.
- You will be provided information on appropriate follow-up medical care.

Law Enforcement Rights

- You can choose to report to the police or not.
- You can choose to have or not have an advocate from the local rape crisis program stay with you during your interview with the police or prosecutor.
- You will be given contact information for the police or prosecutor handling your case.
- You can contact the police or prosecutor for information on the criminal investigation or legal proceedings. The police or prosecutor will inform you of any legal action related to your case.
- If you choose to report to the police, your evidence will be tested within 100 days. You may contact the police for information on a DNA match.
- If you choose not to report to the police, your evidence will be stored for 20 years, or until you decide to release it. You will be notified if your evidence is moved and before the storage period ends.

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You don't have to do this alone. No matter if the harm happened last year, when you were a child, or today, it is not your fault and there are NYC resources ready to support you.

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There are a variety of different resources available to survivors and victims of any form of sexual violence as well as for children and families impacted by violence.

This resource guide is confirmed on an annual basis. We do our best to keep it up-to-date. (Last updated July 2026).

NYPD Special Victims Division 24-Hour Hotline + Report Line

NOTE: This number should NOT replace 911 in emergency situations. Only call the hotline if you're currently safe.

You can call this number if you are a survivor, advocate, hospital, bystander, etc. They will help you with reporting. If an adult calls for an underage survivor, they ask to speak with the survivor directly and have their authorization and approval to send out detectives or investigators. They also take notifications of human trafficking and child sexual abuse. The hotline itself operates in English and Spanish. If you call the hotline and speak other languages, they will connect you to language interpretive services to be able to serve you.

During business hours (M-F, 9am–5pm), you can call any New York City Family Justice Center (FJC) to get connected to free and confidential assistance for victims and survivors of domestic and gender-based violence, which can include sexual violence, human trafficking, stalking, and intimate partner violence.

If you are asked, leave a message and someone will get back to you as quickly as possible. When utilizing FJCs, people are encouraged to use the FJC in the borough where they live or have an open case, unless there is a safety concern. All services are free and confidential.

If providers do not answer the phone, leave a voicemail with a safe number to call you at and specify whether they should leave a voicemail when they call you.

Through any NYC FJC, survivors of domestic and gender-based violence and their children can get connected to organizations that provide case management, economic empowerment, counseling, civil legal, and criminal legal assistance. Located in all five boroughs, FJCs are safe, caring environments that provide one-stop services and support: key city agencies, community, social and civil legal services providers, and District Attorney's Offices are located on-site at FJCs to make it easier for survivors to get help. Services include: mental health and counseling services for both survivors and their children, legal help for orders of protection, custody, visitation, child support, and divorce, offers childcare for children age 3+ while parents seek services at the FJC.

Cyber-sexual Abuse Resources

Cyber-Sexual Abuse Terms & Definitions

As cyber sexual abuse is a phenomenon that has only recently come into public conversation, it can be hard to know what cyber sexual abuse actually looks like. More commonly known as revenge porn, cyber sexual abuse is defined as "any type of sexual harassment, exploitation, or abuse that takes place through screens". There are many different forms of cyber sexual abuse that fall underneath that umbrella definition. Below are some definitions of different forms cyber sexual abuse can take. However, it is important to note that this list is not exhaustive and as the online world continues to evolve, it is likely new forms of cyber sexual abuse will also occur.

**Note: the below definitions could be triggering to read for some survivors.

DEFINITION

Image-based Abuse
(Colloquially known as
revenge porn)

When a perpetrator (sometimes an ex-partner) distributes sexually explicit images of someone online without their consent and sometimes without their knowledge. This can either be when it is posted to a specific website or sent to other people without the photographed person's consent.

Upskirting

When the perpetrator takes photographs of the survivor's private areas underneath their clothing (such as underneath their skirt as the word implies).

Sexting

When someone sends sexually explicit text messages or photos to another party.

Dick Picks

This is a form of sexting. This is when the perpetrator sends pictures of their genitals to another party. This is a form of cyber sexual abuse when said pictures are sent to someone without the receiving party's consent.

Zoom bombing

When a perpetrator interrupts an online meeting (sometimes on Zoom, sometimes not) by playing pornography on the screen or spouting hate or racist speech.

Cyber Stalking

When one party uses online platforms such as social media to stalk another person and invade their privacy. This type of cyber sexual abuse normally is a series of repeated behaviors that make the other party feel unsafe.

Sextortion	This is sexual extortion, when one party coerces another into sending them sexual images. <u>Source</u> ↗
Doxxing	This is defined as sharing a person's private information online without their consent. <u>Source</u> ↗
Child pornography	Creating or posting sexually explicit images of children (anyone under the age of 18) online. <u>Source</u> ↗
DeepFake	Using Artificial intelligence to create fake, convincing images of someone doing something sexually explicit. When used to create nude images, this phenomenon is called DeepNudes. <u>Source</u> ↗
